



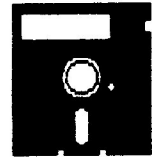

Publish It!3 Update

TimeWorks announced and demonstrated Publish It!3, the latest version of its Desktop Publishing program for Apple IIe, IIc, IIc+ and IIGS computers (at AppleFest in San Francisco). The update should be available by Spring 1990. Added capabilities include color printouts; improved program operation; support for PostScript gray scale printers; the ability to import Super Hi Res graphics (even on IIe's and IIc's); ability to use any IIGS font; improved speed when printing documents; new custom grids for easier text and graphics positioning; AppleWorks v3.0 compatibility; and support of Epson LQ series printers. A low cost upgrade will be available to all registered owners of older versions of Publish It!

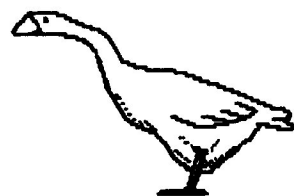

passing on your cash register receipts, but by getting the word out to others about this program. I haven't heard of a school yet that is not taking advantage of this opportunity to add to their computer program.

I had envisioned sitting down at the school's new computer and writing this article. I failed to anticipate the level of competition to get computer time. Having two computers has created new interest in the older Apple IIe as well as the IIGS. Students are staying after school (until 5:00 last night) because of the new interest created by the IIGS!

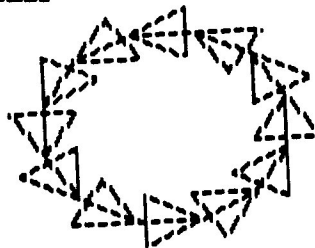
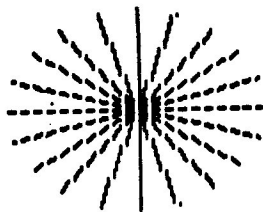
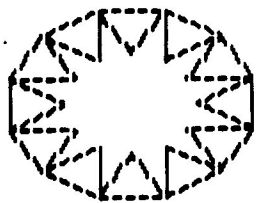
The programs the students are pulling out and using by choice are "Where in the World is Carmen Sandiego", "Where in the USA is Carmen Sandiego," and "Oregon Trail". I am amazed at how "Oregon Trail" has kept students' interest year after year.

The program I am presently using in the 1/2 hour computer class I teach each week is "Logo Plus". This program is geared toward students to learn a program language in order to do graphics and text. The design of the program keeps the students interested and encourages them to use the commands they have learned to create their own designs. I would like to share a few creations that have been turned in so far this year (see bottom of page).

The other emphasis I have in the fall is for students to learn the touch typing method for the keyboard. I use two electric typewriters and the first 12 lessons from a typing course. I like using the typewriters because they cannot correct mistakes. Students master typing from about 15wpm to 40 words per minute. When their typing skill are high enough, I can make assignments on the computer that utilizes the word processor or a publishing program like "Newsroom".

That should bring you up to date at Pratum. Computer Education is quite exciting for us right now.

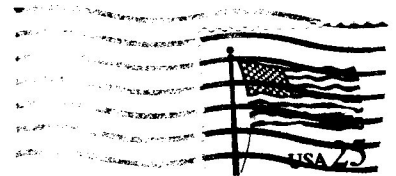
